COURSEDESCRIPTION

This one day introductory course is geared towards clinicians who are interested in understanding the role of the pelvic floor muscle in rehabilitation of female patients. This course will be in lecture and demonstration format and will provide participants with an appreciation for the anatomy and kinesiology of the female pelvic floor muscles. Particular emphasis will be on the role of pelvic floor muscle rehabilitation during physical therapy management of lumbopelvic and hip dysfunction and trunk stability. This course will also discuss function of the pelvic floor during functional activities such as bladder function, bowel function, sexual function, and childbirth. The latest medical and rehabilitation research on pelvic floor muscle function will be presented. Clinical case examples will illustrate the research findings and pelvic floor examination and treatment techniques will be demonstrated.
